

Discipleship Notes



Mark your calendars for Sunday, September 23 for the Appleton Community EFC Fall Kick Off of the Growth/Small Group Ministry. During our worship service, we will highlight the impact and importance of being involved in a "growth group." We will hear from some of our group leaders and a member of one of the groups.

Our study series this fall will be based on the sermon series from 1 John about "The Values and Virtues of Discernment: Learning to Live in God's Light." Pastor Greg is preparing a different format for the devotional guides and each booklet will cover several weeks including both individual study questions and group discussion questions with room to record personal notes. There will also be additional study help for those who will lead or facilitate group discussions. It is our desire that each Growth Group would use these resources in an effort to do a better job of keeping everyone connected through what is being studied in our Growth Group Ministry.

As a result of the July ministry team leaders meeting I shared with the group thoughts from a book I was reading titled "Caring for One Another" written by Edward T. Welch. I felt it tied into Pastor Greg's Sunday morning messages. The book provides 8 ways to cultivate meaningful relationships. Ed reminded me, our calling is to care for each other's souls. In this newsletter I want to share the 8 lessons as given in Welch's book.

- 1. With all humility—our helpfulness, our care for souls, starts with our need for care.
- 2. Move toward others—God takes the initiative and moves toward us; we take the initiative toward others.
- 3. Know the heart—know the person.
- 4. Know the critical influences—if we are to help wisely, we want to know the heart and the significant influences on the heart.
- 5. Be personal and pray—it comes through our personal engagement with each other, our attention to Christ, and prayer.
- 6. Talk about suffering—hardships and suffering are everywhere, and Scripture counters by speaking to our troubles on nearly every page.
- 7. Talk about sin—wise conversations will talk about sin.
- 8. Remember and reflect—*Caring for One Another* has identified ordinary features of person-to-person engagement. There is nothing new here.

I was introduced to Ed Welch's materials during the training I received on biblical counseling. He is highly respected in this field and I encourage you to read his book "Caring for One Another. Why is it that I struggle to tell my neighbors about Jesus? Is one of the reasons because I really don't know my neighbors? Have I become cocooned, only concerned about my own comforts and not concerned about Jesus' heart for the lost?

Streaming video/content, bigger and better TVs that reproduce pixel-perfect high

-definition pictures, cable TV (and all its channels), DVRs and delivery/take-out food have made it possible for me to spin a perceived web of safety and security in my comfortable living room rather than venture out into the real world. Think about your neighborhood for a moment. Do you and your neighbors drive into your garage and close the door right behind yourselves? I know there are times when I do. And, who are our neighbors? Are they just the people next door? Or, are they those with whom we work? Or, those next to us while we exercise? Or, the clerks who provide customer service at the store?

Do we love our neighbors enough to invest in a relationship with them? Do we know their first names? Do we know the names of their children? Do we know what is going on in their lives? Are we praying for them, for their salvation, and for their family?

Being an introvert, I find that I must be intentional in getting to know my neighbors. I need to intentionally make an effort to build a relationship with them to gain the opportunity to share Christ with them. It's quite possible that what our neighbors are desperately seeking is God's unconditional love, flowing through us, in the context of a friendship. This world where we live is strong on social communication and weak on deep relationships. We need to be friends that care for them, so that they will see Christ in our actions and glorify our Father in heaven (Matthew 5:16).

If we believe that our mission as Christians is to reach out into the world around us and love people into a life changing relationship with Christ, then closing our garage door and shutting the world out is probably not a valid approach to successfully reach the world for Christ. Would you agree?

Looking forward to this fall, there are many opportunities to get connected and grow together with your brothers and sisters in Christ. Women's Bible Study, Men's Bible Study, Sunday School classes, and Growth Groups are a few of the opportunities at Appleton Community that we have to help us grow together in Christ. Groups are great opportunities for us to get to know others while doing life together in a caring and encouraging setting. The Challenge of Choices: Discernment Matters

Do you ever wonder how Jesus' disciples or the leaders of the first century church would react if they came to visit us in our contemporary society? How would Peter or John respond to the availability of information (internet, cell phones, television, & other technology)? What would Paul say about computers or about our capability to travel from city—to—city and country—to—country so much faster and more easily than they did? What would these men and women who were pioneers spreading the "good news" of salvation and starting the Church say about the **various options and opportunities we've been given**? Would they think we have it easier than they did—or—would they conclude that the increasing number of "choices" make life more complicated and confusing? Regardless of when or where we live, God's guidelines for "discernment" never expire or change. What's important is that we develop a biblical perspective of how to analyze, evaluate, and examine the options and opportunities we have.

Beginning in September, our Sunday morning study series will be called **"The Values & Virtues of Discernment: Learning to Live in God's Light."** It will be based on 1 John and is designed to help us recognize how the different influences that surround our lives either draw us closer or push us away from an intimate relationship with the Lord.

Let's take a few moments to consider why we need to develop a biblical perspective for making decisions and weighing out our choices.

Ever since "we" were kicked out of the Garden of Eden, people in every generation have faced the challenge of

cultural corruption *because of our sinful nature*. That hasn't changed throughout history because every person (except Jesus Christ) is born with a natural desire to sin. Romans 3—7 clearly and completely explains this reality. Thus, we need to learn how to choose between right & wrong.

Another reason why we need "discernment" is because there is an <u>increasing</u> cultural confusion about what is right and wrong. Paul explains this in many of his letters to the church, but especially in 1&2 Timothy, where he predicts how this problem will grow during "later times." Over the past fifty years (or so) many of the ideals and values about what's acceptable, approved, or appropriate have been re—defined. It would seem that in the majority of these "adjustments," the understanding of what's right and wrong becomes obscure, causing confusion and making some decisions more difficult. What was once distinct, becomes blurred.

A third factor that makes "discernment" necessary is a

Some things in Paul's letters are hard to understand, things the ignorant and unstable twist to their own destruction, as they also do to the rest of the Scriptures. Therefore, dear friends, since you have been warned, be on your guard that you don't become led astray by the error of unprincipled men and fall from your firm grasp on the Truth. But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the honor both now and for eternity.

sense of **cultural chaos** *about what's fair and just*. Our society has placed more and more emphasis on "social justice" and because there is confusion about what's right and wrong, there is an upsurge emphasizing "unqualified equality" without enough consideration for how personal behavior and choices have contributed to what appears to be unfair. I'm not stating any specific conclusions about this, but it's essential that we realize how much this forces the necessity for biblical truth to guide our response to this.

Finally, we also need a greater ability to "differentiate" between our options and opportunities because of **cultural complications** *that stem from having so many alternatives from which we can choose*. There are times when the number of choices we have can be overwhelming. I've heard how some people avoid certain grocery stores because of the large selection, but others love the variety and go to the stores that overwhelm their friends. However, we still must acknowledge that multiple options require greater discernment.

Please notice what Peter tells us about developing a biblical perspective in 2 Peter 3:16—18 (inserted above). When our appreciation for God's grace and our application of His Truth increases, so does our ability to avoid being led astray by the changes in our culture.
