-Some Questions for Personal Reflection & Discussion-

- —Please carefully read Nehemiah 1:1–2:20 in preparation for this week's study & also ask the Lord to use these studies to strengthen our church ministry. These questions focus on the applications noted in the sermon.
- —1} The true content & character of our trust in the Lord is revealed by our prayer lives! We should never underestimate the value of prayer! Based on Nehemiah's example, how would you explain the importance of prayer to someone who is questioning why we should take time to pray when we could be actively doing something about the problems or concerns we are facing? What does the content of our prayers reveal about our faith?
- —2— One of the most important lessons we all need to learn is the proper margin (balance) between busyness & relaxation. Nehemiah's motivation & drive lead us to assume that he was a man of action. But when he arrived in Jerusalem, he took some time to rest & reflect on what needed to be done. In our fast—paced world, it's common for us to leave too little margin for proper rest & refreshment. This can lead to many challenges (health issues, poor relationships, unwise decisions, sin & spiritual battles, to name a few). What's the cause for this? Why should we be concerned? What steps should we take to avoid this? How should we hold one another accountable?
- —3— Another essential lesson we all need to learn is how to find the secret to being content with what God has given us, without allowing ourselves to become too comfortable, complacent, accustomed, or accepting of the consequences of sin. The Jewish people didn't seem to realize how they had become comfortable with their surroundings. How does our sin—saturated society condition us to become tolerant of sin? How has this impacted or potentially harmed the effectiveness of the Church thru—out our culture?
- —4— Am I available & ready to go & do what God lays on my heart? Am I quenching the Spirit of others who are trying to do what God has laid on their hearts? What personal steps could I take to make sure that I'm aware of the opportunities God has given me to serve Him?
- —5— Am I regularly wearing the Spiritual Armor God has provided to enable us to stand out, stand up, & stand strong against the opposition that comes when we're doing what God has laid on our hearts in God's way? How has the need for this increased in our culture today? Please notice what 2 Timothy 3:1–17 says about this!
