A Series Of Studies About Joseph's Life (Genesis 37–50)

When Joseph's Childhood Dreams Became True: Prophecies, A Proposal, A Promotion, & A Plague

Genesis 41:1-42:9; Proverbs 1; 1 Corinthians 1-2; Psalm 105

- —Genesis 37 = Joseph's **dreams** & **clothing** became a theme to follow
- —Genesis 39 = Joseph's clothing was used to accuse him & put him in jail
- —Genesis 40 = With God's help, he accurately interpreted two **dreams**
- —Genesis 41 = God's timing is perfect: It led to some fancy new clothes
- —A summary that introduces today's message: After two more years, the cupbearer finally remembered Joseph because Pharaoh needed someone to interpret his dreams. After God enabled Joseph to explain the meaning of Pharaoh's dreams, He elevated Joseph to an unexpected position where his strategies would prepare for the severe famine!
- —Three additional highlights that we shouldn't ignore:
- 1) Joseph lived before there were any written instructions from God. His faith in the Lord is evident thru—out Genesis 37—30, but there is no explanation about how he became such a faithful follower of YHWH. What we can assume is that in His sovereign authority, God chose Joseph for the very special role he fulfilled as a *savior* for his father, Jacob's family and also for the world during the famine.
- 2) Joseph is an amazing example of a godly person who faithfully used his God—given abilities to honor & glorify God in what most people would describe as a secular job. He was gifted as an administrator. In our Christian culture today, some would look at Joseph's Christ—like character & question how someone who is as spiritual as he was could be satisfied or fulfilled in the role he had? We should recognize that every authentically faithful follower of the Lord is a full—time minister, regardless of where they work.
- 3) If the cupbearer had remembered to tell Pharaoh about Joseph when Joseph expected it to happen, Joseph wouldn't have become the Prime Minister of Egypt. God's timing is always perfect in what's necessary to fulfill God's plans & purposes.

This week, we're trying to learn the lessons from the example we find in Joseph's life. Please carefully read Genesis 41:1–42:9 to prepare for the study questions below.

- —1— Genesis 37–50 repeatedly reminds us that God was with Joseph. Even though Pharaoh was the ruler of a nation that worshipped idols and practiced multiple rituals that disregarded God, he noticed that Joseph had "a divine spirit." (See 41:38.) What are some specific lessons we can learn from how Joseph honored God in a secular society?
- —2— From what we read in Genesis 41, we can conclude that Joseph maintained a humble perspective of his ability to interpret dreams. In other words, it didn't lead to pride. He gave God all the credit for what he was able to do. Is it ever acceptable to accept praise or honor for doing what God enables us to do? How do we guard against becoming proud of what we can do? What's the difference between being confident in the talents, gifts, or abilities God has given us & becoming too self—sufficient because we've gained some competence? What's involved in harmonizing personal success with having a biblical values?
- **—3—** When Pharaoh met Joseph & suggested that he could interpret dreams, Joseph clearly told Pharaoh that he couldn't do it, but God would give Pharaoh a favorable answer. Put yourself in Joseph's place. How would you have responded to Pharaoh? What does this tell us about Joseph's faith & trust in the Lord?
